

# TRS News - Returns, Retiring, and Returning

Hello to our GREA friends across Georgia! First, let me say that it was great to see some of our retirees recently at the GREA area 7 and 8 meeting! Having spent both my childhood and much of my adult work life in middle Georgia, I have so many wonderful friends in that area, and reuniting with several during my visit was

such a pleasure. Additionally, our other TRS team members who got to spend time with the GREA regional attendees have shared what a wonderful experience that this was for them as well. Thanks for your continued friendship and hospitality! In this article, I want to give you an update on Returns, Retiring, and Returning. Read on with me, please, to see where we go with this!

**Returns**. I am not sure that I've ever met anyone who genuinely didn't want to make more money. Oh, some are more driven than others, but having enough money to live, pay our bills, and help others is important. Making money on the investments of our retirement system, or for one's other retirement investments for that matter, is important. As far as I am aware, most every retirement plan, be it a Defined Benefit or Defined Contribution (401K, etc.), depends on making a return on its investments in order to be sustainable for current and future retirees. This has been a really good year for most investors, and it has been a really good year for our retirement system. Our year ending return on our investments was 14.5% which marks two consecutive years of double-digit returns! Such returns on our investments helps to enhance our plan's ability to continue to pay benefits, COLA's, and improve its funding ratio! Based on the success of other retirement plans whose returns I have seen in recent weeks, it certainly appears that our returns will be among the best in the nation. That's good news for all of us!

**Retiring**. I want to heartily congratulate the new 2024 retirees. Some 6,500 new retirees have joined the ranks of being a "retired educator." The number of our new retirees this year went up by approximately 177 retirees; however, this follows two consecutive years of declines in the number of people retiring in our system. This is a special, and hopefully, rewarding and happy time of life for an educator. For the rest of your lives, you can cherish the knowledge that you have influenced the lives of literally thousands of young people in your educational careers while also receiving a monthly benefit if you are a TRS retiree. You've educated professionals in all walks of the work life who have transitioned into being successful adults. I can think of no life work that is of greater importance. Thank you for your service as an educator!

**Returning**. As a retired educator, you should be aware that in both Georgia and across the nation, there is an ongoing teacher shortage. One of the ways this teacher shortage is partially alleviated is through allowing retirees to return to work and continue to draw their retirement benefit. Seemingly seeing more states, including Georgia, have relaxed return to work rules to help with the teacher shortage. We have had approximately 382 retired teachers return to work last year as a full-time teacher in a critical needs field in accordance with the provision set forth in Georgia law.

Interestingly, we have had a record number of retirees return to work part-time this past year. A whopping 15,000 retired educators have been approved to return to work under these part time work provisions. Retired educators serve an extremely valuable function in helping to ensure that we have quality educators in Georgia's classrooms. We hypothesize that this number has increased due to 1) higher

than normal inflation over the past few years, and 2) the continued and growing teacher shortage in our state and nation.

In closing, let me say a sincere "thank you" for your work as a Georgia educator! Thank you for the privilege that our team has in serving you as a retired educator. Finally, remember one of my favorite quotes: "retired educators are some of the happiest people I know!




